We look forward to celebrating your child's Baptism with you!

To help us prepare for this special celebration, the "Baptismal Packet" must be completed and returned to the parish office before we can schedule your baptism.

The first form is the Baptismal Information, which gives us the necessary information regarding the child to be baptized and his/her parents. Please note that if you are not a member of St. Ignatius, you will need to have the pastor of your parish sign, date and seal the form.

The second form (two copies) is the Baptismal Sponsor Information Form for the chosen sponsors to fill out. Both forms must be filled out. Please keep in mind that both sponsors must be Christian and at least one must be a practicing Catholic. If the sponsor is Catholic, they will need to have the pastor of the Catholic church where they are registered, sign and seal the form. Non-Catholic sponsors only need to fill out the top of the form.

If this is your first child to be baptized, you must attend an instructional baptism class. You can call the parish office to set that up. (419-693-1150; lperlaky@stiggys.org) Please complete the baptismal packet and bring it with you to the class.

Once that is completed call the parish office and schedule the baptism. (419-693-1150; lperlaky@stiggys.org)

Questions Based on Required Qualifications of a Godparent

Kindly answer the following questions which are formulated in conformity with the required qualifications for those serving in the role of Godparent, enumerated and contained in the Code of Canon Law, can. 874.

- 1) A Godparent must be fully initiated into the Catholic Church (kindly attach a certificate of baptism with notations).

- 5) If married, a Godparent must be married in the Catholic Church or have had their marriage regularized/recognized in the Church and strive to live married life in accord with the teachings of the Church. Catholics who were married civilly, or at another Christian church without a dispensation from the Catholic Church, and those cohabiting would not meet the requirements to serve as a Godparent at this time. ¹ If the potential Godparent is younger than sixteen years of age, the pastor of the parish where the baptism is to take place or the minister of baptism may, for a just reason, make an exception and admit that person to serve as a Godparent (cf. CIC can. 874 §1, 2°).



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GODPARENT INFORMATION SHEET

Godparents in the Catholic Tradition . . .

When you invite a person to serve as your child's godparent, you are asking this individual to make a lifelong commitment to your child. The day of your child's Baptism marks just the beginning of the godparent-godchild relationship. It is the hope of the Church and the Catholic community that your child's godparents will be lifelong companions who will nurture your child's faith and help him or her become a true disciple of Christ.

The Catholic community calls godparents to:

- ▶ help their godchild grow in faith
- ▶ teach their godchild about Catholic traditions
- ▶ model for their godchild how to live a Catholic life

The law of the Roman Catholic Church requires that each child being baptized have one godparent to serve as his or her spiritual role model and friend. This godparent may be male or female. Two godparents—one godmother and one godfather—are the custom in the United States, but are not required.

To be a Catholic godparent, one must:

- ▶ be a Catholic who has received the Sacrament of Confirmation and regularly participates in the Eucharist
- ▶ be an active member of a Catholic faith community
- ▶ be at least sixteen years old

When choosing a godparent for your child, it may be helpful to consider the following:

- 1 Is this person actively practicing his or her faith? Does he or she worship at Sunday Eucharist regularly? *(This is the most important question to ask. If the person selected is not an active, practicing Catholic, he or she will not be able to fulfill effectively the role of godparent.)*
- 2 Does this person live close enough, or will this person have sufficiently frequent contact, to get to know your child and play an active role in your child's faith life?
- 3 Does this person know enough about the Catholic Church and Catholic faith to be able to teach your child about it?
- 4 If something happened to you, would this person make sure your child was raised as an active member of the Catholic community?

What is a Christian witness? Some families may wish to have a non-Catholic Christian also serve as a sponsor for their child. Although at least one Catholic godparent is required, a baptized non-Catholic Christian may be invited to serve as a "Christian witness" who will participate in the celebration and will stand alongside the godparent during the baptismal ceremony.

Something to Think About

Something to Read

▶ Romans 5:13, 15, 18

▶ In the *Rite of Baptism*, the priest prays a "prayer of exorcism" over the child, saying these words:

We pray for this child:
set him (her) free from original sin,
make him (her) a temple of your glory,
and send your Holy Spirit to dwell with him (her).
We ask this through Christ our Lord.

When parents look at the innocence and beauty of their newborn infant, nothing could possibly seem stranger than to suggest that this child is branded by sin. Indeed, if original sin were thought of as some sort of personal fault in the child, such an idea would rightly be dismissed as absurd. However, original sin is *not a personal fault*; it is an *inherited condition*.

Original sin is the name we give to the state of humanity that inclines every human being to evil and makes us all subject to temptation. Every child is born into a sinful world and is immersed—even before reaching personal consciousness—in the sinful conditions that breed war, ethnic hatred, corporate greed, and a host of other evils from which we all need to be delivered. No one escapes being under the influence of this dark cloud of evil that hangs over our broken human condition.

Paradoxically, the *removal* of original sin in Baptism is actually the *infusion* of Christ's grace and love into the heart and soul of a child. As the prayer above states, freedom from original sin is accomplished by the gift of the Holy Spirit, a gift that makes a child the temple of God's glory.

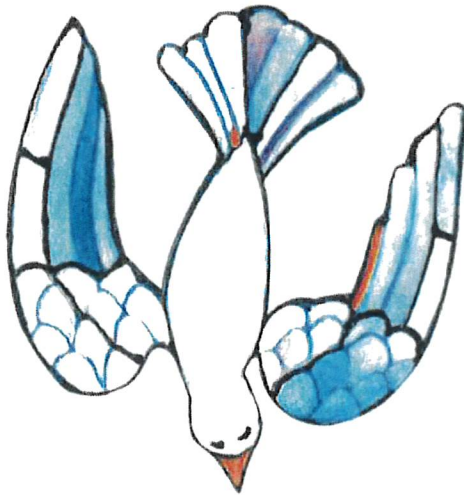
When a child is joined to the Church—the Body of Christ—that child is effectively inserted into a world of grace. Although sin and temptation will always remain present in the child's life because we cannot escape it in this world, the child now shares in the Reign of God already present in its beginnings in this world.

Saving Grace

Summary of the Church's Understanding of Original Sin

- ▶ Every human person is born into a world where the negative influence and effects of sin and evil surround us and are inescapable.
- ▶ Every human person is born into this world with an inclination to evil that makes us subject to temptation.
- ▶ Every human person is born in need of the saving grace of God that is available to us in Jesus Christ.
- ▶ This inherited condition that we are born with is what the Church calls *original sin*.
- ▶ It is the infusion of God's grace in Baptism that removes original sin and restores us to our "original justice" by giving us a share in God's own divine life.

Reflection and Discussion



How is this explanation of original sin different than your previous understanding of the concept?
